Our Funding Model

The South Jersey Institute for Population Health (SJIPH) provides funding for **local communities** and **community-based organizations** engaging with researchers at **Rowan University** and **Rutgers University-Camden**. Our funding cycles serve the region and provide seed funding to local and regional projects.

The SJIPH funding process centers equity and acknowledges the many barriers that community organizations, as well as researchers, face when trying to address complex issues of health and health inequity. One example of how our funding cycle helps projects address these challenges is the **Sandbox Event** (pictured) at which prospective grantees participate in strategic planning sessions with a facilitator provided by SJIPH.



Our Impact

We promote favorable health outcomes and strengthen university-community partnerships in South Jersey. This includes characterizing the nature and prevalence of health outcomes throughout the region, and identifying ways to improve them. Our funded projects lay the groundwork for investment in identifying and understanding challenges in our region and exploring specific solutions.
